

Janjay is an energetic, smart, and curious little girl living in the West African country of Liberia.

She is responsible for collecting clean water for the household on a regular basis, but one day finds herself distracted by afternoon fun with a friend, which causes her to neglect her chores. She later discovers the seriousness of her actions and learns a real-life lesson about disobedience and the important role she plays in her family.

Through humor and the use of local language, this story brings to light the global issue of access to clean-water sanitation that resonates with millions of girls around the world.

Discussion Guide

About This Guide

The questions for discussion that follow are intended to enhance children's reading and understanding of the book. The guide can be used on a one-to-one basis or as part of a small children's reading group.

- 1. What are your overall thoughts of the book? How did it make you feel?
- 2. Who is your favourite character in the story and why?
- 3. Think about one of the minor characters (Zangar, Bendu, Joe-Joe, Daddy, etc.) in the story. Why did the author include him/her?
- 4. Is the setting of the story important to the book? In what ways?
- 5. How does Janjay's life in Liberia differ from yours? What are some of the similarities?
- 6. How does the use of local language help enrich the setting of the story?
- 7. What does the purple cup that Janjay uses during her morning routine represent? (Pg. 3-5)
- 8. What does The Adventures of Gwendolyn book series represent? (Pg. 5, 19, 37)
- 9. Why do you think Janjay slept in Joe-Joe's bed face to face when he was sick? (Pg. 1 & 34)
- 10. What do you think the moral of the story is?
- 11. What lessons can be learned from Mrs. Grimes? (Pg. 30)
- 12. Why do you think Janjay believes that because Gwendolyn (the main character in her book series) doesn't have to collect water in London, the story must be fiction? (Pg. 37)
- 13. Reportedly 663 million people are without access to clean-water sanitation (as of 2017)
